

## GCSE grades are changing

GCSEs in England are being reformed and will be graded with a new scale from 9 to 1, with 9 being the highest grade.

English literature, English language and maths will be the first subjects to be graded in this way from Summer 2017. The subjects with the highest numbers of candidates (e.g. arts, humanities, languages) will follow in 2018 and most others in 2019. During this transition, students will receive a mixture of letter and number grades. This is happening as GCSEs are being reformed to make them more challenging, to keep pace with employers' and universities demands. The government's definition of a 'good pass' will be set at grade 5 for reformed GCSEs.

The diagram below shows how the numbered grades compare to the current A\* to G system.
