
Shared Reading

The shared reading initiative introduced this term has helped more students read more often and for longer.

Just as exercise helps your body stay healthy, reading is an exercise that helps keep your brain fit. Twice a week, students have an extended tutor time to take part in shared reading. Students are reading a book together in their tutor groups.

Mrs Hocking, Assistant Head said: "There's something special about sharing a story with someone: following the journey of a characters together and imagining whole new worlds. We wanted to bring that experience to our students through reading a story with them, not because it is on the curriculum or they will be assessed on it, but to promote reading for pleasure.

We also wanted students to recognise that reading isn't just something that they do in an English classroom, with their English teacher. So by extending tutor time, tutors have been able to share a story with their tutees and we've also been able to have guest readings from Heads of Year and Senior Leaders. Each student has their own copy of the book, so that they follow along as they are read to and some of the students have been involved in reading to their class too."

Online Tutoring

Year 11 students were given the opportunity to receive additional tutoring in English, Maths and Science, in a first of its kind at Brannel.

During Brannel Challenge, students attended virtual meetings and tutoring sessions via Microsoft Teams with student teachers at Bolton University.

Brannel students were able to set their own targets and the university tailored the sessions to help meet the individual needs of our students.

The pilot project has inspired Brannel to explore future online opportunities to enhance our students' learning.

British Council International School Award

Brannel School has been awarded Foundation level of the British Council's prestigious International School Award in recognition of its work to bring the world into the classroom.

The International School Award celebrates the achievements of schools that do exceptional work in international education. Fostering an international dimension in the curriculum is at the heart of the British Council's work with schools, so that young people gain the cultural understanding and skills they need for life and work in today's world.

Brannel's international work includes a cultural exchange trip to New York earlier in the year.

Mr Cooper, Deputy Head said: "We have been working with our two partner schools Woodstock Day School in New York and Kunskapsskolan in Sweden since early 2019, and have embedded a sustainable programme of international learning that we hope will raise the cultural capital and aspirations for all of our young people.

Thanks to the funding from the British Council, last year we were able to run an exchange visit to New York, where our pupils attended an international summit on climate change and youth empowerment. This is such wonderful recognition of the hard work and commitment of our staff, in particular Miss Chapple and Mr Richards, who ran the trip. We are now planning a visit to Sweden in the 2021/22 academic year, where we hope to continue to foster and develop our relationships with the schools in our network."

John Rolfe MBE, Schools Outreach Manager at the British Council, said: "Brannel School's international work has earned the school well-deserved recognition in the form of the British Council International School Award - Foundation Certificate.

We are delighted and proud that Brannel School is committed to developing a whole school approach to embedding and celebrating international work. The school staff dedication is enriching education and supporting globally aware young people and key skills development.

Creative STEM Skills

We are living through a period of unprecedented change. Technology is transforming the way that businesses organise themselves and the products and services they offer. We have always needed technological know-how in our economy, but the nature of these changes makes science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) skills more vital than ever.

This term, Year 10 students were challenged to complete a series of STEM tasks during Brannel Challenge.

The weekly sessions were designed to encourage them to work together to overcome a problem, to work under pressure and manage their time to complete the challenges.

Students created bridges, bionic arms, transport systems and boats in small teams. They also tried their hand at code-breaking.

Numerous studies indicate that tomorrow's jobs will demand creative problem-solving skills and therefore it is a key priority for Brannel School.

Eco Ambassadors Connect with U.S. and Sweden


