	Year 7 starts with a study early Britain up to 1066, including the Anglo-Saxons, Vikings, and the Battle of Hastings, leading to William the Conqueror's victory and Norman rule in England.						Students explore how the Norman Conquest reshaped England with castles, feudalism, and the Domesday Book, blending Norman and Anglo-Saxon cultures over generations.						This unit looks at power in medieval England, where kings, nobles, and the Church held authority, shaping society through feudalism, castles, and the Magna Carta.						Students examine health and medicine in Medieval England, exploring the Black Death, lack of sanitation, herbal remedies, and medical practices in monasteries.						This unit focuses on how the Tudor monarchs, religious changes, exploration, cultural developments and diversity shaped our history						Students explore the Stuart era and the English Civil War, looking battles like Edgehill and Marston Moor, and complete a local study of Cornwall's role in this conflict.

It covers key events and its impact on society, economy, and global history						Students undertake a local history project which examines Cornwall's mining and engineering developments, economic shifts, and social impacts during the 18th and 19th centuries.						This unit explores the development of the British Empire from the 1600's focussing on expansion, governance, economic impact, cultural exchanges, and eventual decline.						Students investigate the transatlantic enslavement of Africans, examining its economic, social, and cultural impacts on Africa, Europe, the Americas, and the Caribbean.						This unit looks at struggles for equality by African Americans, how laws changed, and leaders like Martin Luther King Jr. emerged.						Students explore immigration's impact on Britain, tracing waves of migration, cultural diversity, integration, and the ways modern British society has been enriched.
